explains Tim Kerr, "We didn't want to form a band, we wanted to form a roving gang of toughs."

The individual members of The Monkeywrench have each been committed to their respective bands for a good many years. Kerr himself has been lauded as "an Austin institution," having done time with the Big Boys, Bad Mutha Goose, and Poison 13. Monkeywrench singer Mark Arm is best known for his groundbreaking percussion work with the Thrown Ups. Bassist Steve Turner has recently arrived on the scene as a new member of the Fallouts. Drummer Martin Bland is an Australian refugee formerly of Lubricated Goat. Tom Price not only invented punkrock, but also spanks the plank for local heap toppers Gas Huffer. Kerr continues, "We all really wanted to do something fresh just for fun where it wasn't like 'Ugh, I've been in this band for six years.' I've been playing full time since '78, so it's nice to do something just for the hell of it."

An album by The Monkeywrench slated for February release is titled Clean as a Broke-Dick Dog. The record consists mostly of dark, swampy blues numbers delivered with punk rock intensity, although there are some forays into early seventies metal-punk insanity, like "I'm Blown" or the Blue Cheer cover "Out of Focus." "I've always liked that

Stoogey-type stuff," says Kerr, "Consequently I think the album ended up kinda like '60s garage meets Black Flag."

The whole thing began when Mudhoney and Gas Huffer swung through Austin last year and Arm and Price met Kerr through mutual friends. "Tom and Mark had told me that they had been really into Poison 13. says Kerr, "And I had those songs that I had started for Poison 13 but never completed. Some of the songs had no words and others had words written by Mike, the singer for Poison 13, but nobody could understand what the hell they were. So I thought, Well, do t toes these songs out so that

After many tearful goodbyes, Kerr returned to Austin, Texas. "Before long, I got a call from Mark telling me that Sub Pop was going to release the album and they needed a name for it. Mark had been reading the Miles Davis autobiography, and Miles would always use the expression he was clean as a broke-

was a lot of fun. In fact, I have been talking to Mark about the possibility of doing some shows here in Austin, Dallas, and Houston after the album has been out for awhile."

Sub Pop has already released a seven-inch single by the Monkeywrench featuring "Bottle Up and Go" as the a side and "Out of Focus" and an alternate version of "Cold, Cold World" on the flip on red vinyl and a takeoff on the Impulse label jazz album covers of the '50s." Everybody down here keeps calling me up and asking me for a copy of the single. Sub Pop sent me four and I gave them all away. I didn't even have the good sense to keep one for myself!"

"In the end, I am very pleased with Clean as a Broke-Duck Dog. It would be difficult to get away from comparisons to Poison 13, because the songs were written in that same period in that same sort of vein, but I always liked Poison 13, in particular I am fond of that first Poison 13 album, and I think Clean... is as good if not better than that." Meantime, Tim Kerr is keeping reasonably busy, "Working on some hip-hop stuff with a friend, writing a lot of stuff, and just generally having a good time not having to go to band practice for the first time in fourteen years."

"We figured hell, if we can get this stuff to sound decent on tape, then maybe we can get away with pulling off a live show."

happy with the recording," says

dick dog to describe a well-dressed guy who looked really sharp, so I thought it would make the perfect album title in light of the band's snappily attired demeanor, although to be honest I still am kinda mystified by what the phrase actually means."

In mid-July, Kerr flew back to Seattle (this time, Sub Pop paid his way) to mix the album and add finishing touches. "The next time I came out that Scientists guy (Kim Salmon) was out there playing, so Mark suggested that we play another show with him at the Crocodile Cafe and it went really well, it
